

Recipe of the Month: Easy Mexican Goulash

This recipe is easy to make as long as the cutting is done ahead of time. We here have to take turns cutting onions as we make a triple batch. The tears are worth the effort as this is the prettiest goulash around. Corn, peppers, and tomatoes make this healthy, flavorful, and colorful. Enjoy!

Directions

Step 1

Chop onion and green pepper (or preferred variety)

Step 2

Brown meat with the onion, green pepper, and Worcestershire sauce. Meat is done when brown and crumbly

Step 3

Drain meet veggie mixture and add tomatoes, corn, salsa, and taco seasoning. Simmer while doing the next step

Step 4

Boil pasta, stirring occasionally, until cooked but firm to bite. (approx. 8min)

Step 5

Drain pasta and combine with beef mixture

Ingredients

- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1/4 cup green pepper, chopped
- 1 Tb Worcestershire sauce
- 1 (10oz) can diced tomatoes with green chile peppers
- 1 (9oz) package frozen corn
- 1/2 cup medium salsa
- 2 Tb taco seasoning
- 1 (8oz) package elbow macaroni
- 1 can tomato paste

COIN COLLECTING PT. 2

Last month we touched on the five most popular and common categories of coins. Now we will talk on how to get them without it costing so much.

We'll start with Challenge Coins. Due to their rising popularity, you can pretty much get them anywhere. I got most of mine in thrift stores. Because of the cost to customize and order them, a lot of places will offer them to members of their organizations. A lot of places sell them as fundraisers. I also search places, like eBay. I also used to frequent an indoor vendor mall in Muskegon where the person was selling all types of coins. That is where I got the Mini Eisenhower Dollar from as well.

For the other coins, like the foreign and error coins, I simply just searched my quarter rolls I get from the bank when I get paid. Apart from Canadian coins, I have gotten English Pence coins and even German coins. When I was a kids, I would check the vending machines for forgotten change and once I found a French coin. I found a coin from the Bahama's just laying in the middle of the road (not recommended to search or pick up from there, but it was a quiet road off the beaten path at the time) Estate sales are another option. Some places know the value, but they know if they charge the value prices, most times, they will have to hang onto it for a lot longer than they want too. A friend of mine even checks the reject spot in coin star machines. Some people just don't want to take them with them because they don't care due to no real value in the US outside of collectors. I got my Mexican Peso's from a neighbor who used to visit there a lot before she retired.

The Russian Ruble I got off of wish when it was popular. I just got it because it was a coin with a dolphin on it. (No joke) But also goes to show you a lot of these other options are also a great idea if you want to find special issues without spending hundreds of dollars. (Even foreign coins can range in the \$100-\$200 range if you buy them in the US, and even more if you get them from country of origin because you might have import tax and tariffs as well (even if you get them by mail)

Closeout sales at places. Closeout sales are sales on items that will no longer be available from that place or manufacturer. Depending on the place, you can get anywhere from 20%-90% off. Coin stores don't usually do that because they know they can get the amount they want from other stores.

The novelty coins, you can find them in tons of places. John Ball Zoo still has the machines where you place a Penny in and then the quarters and it will flatten them. They even now have a machine that will etch and image in a coin for you (but are pretty expensive. Last I saw they were roughly \$5 each)

Then there are always "Gifts". I got my WWI War Bonds coin from a place called Mystic Stamps as a new member offer. I'm not into stamp collecting, but they also sell coins that have images of stamps on them. And like I said, gifts. For Mother's and Father's Day I found a site that let's you add custom names to coins and I bought both Parents a Mother's and Father's Challenge Coin with their name engraved on it. Was actually less than \$20.

Trading. Like Baseball or Hockey cards. Trading card companies are also now coming out with their own trading coin series. (But kinda aren't almost worth it) Some people will trade for a coins as well. Example, someone needs a National Parks US Quarter P mark and you need D mark, so you trade. Just be careful with this option

And finally, change from the store. Mostly if it is in coin form, sometimes stores will take them. I have gotten a few foreign coins as regular change from DG and the like. Those ones weren't Canadian, but I ended up still giving them to neighbors who were collecting before I started to officially.






